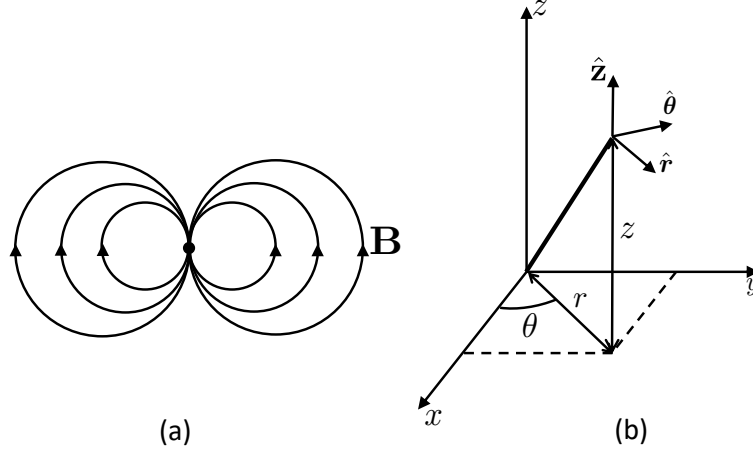


Figure 1: (a) Dipolar magnetic field. (b) Cylindrical coordinates.

1. Consider the dipolar magnetic field shown in figure 1(a). The magnetic field of a dipole is

$$\mathbf{B}(r, z) = B_r \hat{\mathbf{r}} + B_z \hat{\mathbf{z}} = -\frac{1}{r} \frac{\partial \psi}{\partial z} \hat{\mathbf{r}} + \frac{1}{r} \frac{\partial \psi}{\partial r} \hat{\mathbf{z}}, \quad (1)$$

where the flux function $\psi(r, z)$ is

$$\psi(r, z) = -\frac{Ar^2}{(r^2 + z^2)^{3/2}}. \quad (2)$$

Here A is a positive constant, $\{r, \theta, z\}$ are the usual cylindrical coordinates, shown in figure 1(b), and $\{\hat{\mathbf{r}}, \hat{\boldsymbol{\theta}}, \hat{\mathbf{z}}\}$ are the usual unit vectors associated to the cylindrical coordinates, also shown in figure 1(b).

Particles of charge Ze and mass m move in the dipolar magnetic field (1). There is an electrostatic electric field $\mathbf{E} = -\nabla\phi$ present. The corresponding electrostatic potential depends only on the flux function $\psi(r, z)$, that is, $\phi(r, z) = \phi(\psi(r, z))$. Assume that the characteristic gyroradius ρ of the particles is small compared to the characteristic size of the system. Assume as well that the force due to the electric field \mathbf{E} is comparable in size to the magnetic force on the particles. Using the lowest-order guiding centre equations, answer the following questions.

- (a) [5 marks] Show that particles move on surfaces of constant $\psi(r, z)$ and that their velocity in the θ -direction is of the form $v_\theta = r\Omega_\theta(\psi)$, where the rotation frequency $\Omega_\theta(\psi) = d\phi/d\psi$ only depends on ψ .
- (b) [10 marks] Show that the quantity

$$U = \frac{1}{2}mv_\parallel^2 + m\mu B - \frac{1}{2}m\Omega_\theta^2(\psi)r^2 \quad (3)$$

is conserved. Here, v_\parallel is the velocity of the particle parallel to the magnetic field, and μ is the magnetic moment of the particle.

- (c) [8 marks] Sketch the magnitude of the magnetic field B as a function of r on a surface $\psi(r, z) = \text{constant}$, and use this sketch to briefly describe the particle motion for (i) $\mu = 0$, and (ii) $m\mu B \gg m\Omega_\theta^2 r^2/2$.
- (d) [7 marks] Calculate the distribution function of the particles $f(r, z, v_\parallel, \mu)$ everywhere given the distribution function at $z = 0$, which is

$$f(r, z = 0, v_\parallel, \mu) = n_0 \left(\frac{m}{2\pi T_0} \right)^{3/2} \exp \left(-\frac{m(v_\parallel^2/2 + \mu B(r, z = 0))}{T_0} \right). \quad (4)$$

The density n_0 and the temperature T_0 at $z = 0$ do not depend on r . Using the distribution function that you have obtained, calculate the density $n = \int f d^3v$ everywhere. Why does the density have a gradient?

2. The lower-hybrid resonance is used in magnetic confinement devices to drive plasma current. To model the propagation of the wave into the plasma, consider a plasma in a constant magnetic field $B\hat{\mathbf{z}}$ composed of ions with charge Ze and mass m_i and electrons with charge $-e$ and mass m_e . The ion and electron densities $n_s(x)$ depend on x , and they satisfy quasineutrality, $Zn_i(x) = n_e(x)$. The value of the electron plasma frequency $\omega_{pe}(x)$ ranges from zero at the edge of the plasma to a maximum value $\omega_{pe,M}$ that is comparable to the electron gyrofrequency Ω_e . The wavevector of the propagating wave is $\mathbf{k} = k_\perp\hat{\mathbf{x}} + k_\parallel\hat{\mathbf{z}}$, and its frequency satisfies $\omega \sim \sqrt{\Omega_i\Omega_e}$, where Ω_i is the ion gyrofrequency.

- (a) [5 marks] For densities such that $\omega_{pe} \sim \Omega_e$, show that the elements ϵ_\perp , g and ϵ_\parallel of the cold plasma dielectric tensor can be approximated by

$$\epsilon_\perp \simeq 1 + \frac{\omega_{pi}^2}{\Omega_e\Omega_i} - \frac{\omega_{pi}^2}{\omega^2}, \quad g \simeq -\frac{\omega_{pi}^2}{\omega\Omega_i}, \quad \epsilon_\parallel \simeq -\frac{\omega_{pe}^2}{\omega^2}, \quad (5)$$

where ω_{pi} is the ion plasma frequency.

- (b) [3 marks] Using ray tracing, show that k_\parallel is constant.
(c) [7 marks] Show that k_\perp is given by

$$A \left(\frac{k_\perp c}{\omega} \right)^4 + B \left(\frac{k_\perp c}{\omega} \right)^2 + C = 0. \quad (6)$$

Give the coefficients A , B and C as functions of k_\parallel and of the components of the dielectric tensor ϵ_\perp , g and ϵ_\parallel .

- (d) [5 marks] At the lower-hybrid resonance, the perpendicular wavevector k_\perp diverges. Argue that the slow wave is the one that resonates. Determine the density $n_{e,LH}$ at which the resonance happens as a function of ω , and hence show that $\omega < \sqrt{\Omega_i\Omega_e}$.

[Hint: show first that one of the coefficients A , B or C must vanish for k_\perp to diverge.]

- (e) [8 marks] Show that the fast and slow waves have the same phase velocity at the densities

$$n_{e\pm} = \frac{\epsilon_0 m_i \omega^2}{Ze^2} \left[\frac{k_\parallel c}{\sqrt{\Omega_i\Omega_e}} \pm \sqrt{1 + \frac{k_\parallel^2 c^2}{\Omega_i\Omega_e} - \frac{k_\parallel^2 c^2}{\omega^2}} \right]^2. \quad (7)$$

- (f) [3 marks] Show that the densities n_{e-} and n_{e+} exist only for $k_\parallel < k_{\parallel,M}$, where $k_{\parallel,M}$ is a function of frequency that you must determine.
(g) [2 marks] For $k_\parallel < k_{\parallel,M}$, show that the wave cannot propagate into regions with electron density such that $n_{e-} < n_e < n_{e+}$.
(h) [5 marks] For $k_\parallel < k_{\parallel,M}$, show that $n_{e-} < n_{e,LH}$ and hence the wave cannot reach the lower-hybrid resonance when launched from the edge of the plasma.
(i) [2 marks] Determine a minimum k_\parallel for which the wave can propagate from the edge to the lower-hybrid resonance. Based on this value of k_\parallel , argue that the wave cannot be launched in vacuum.

(For interest: due to this result, lower-hybrid wave antennae must be located inside the plasma, and they can suffer significant damage for this reason.)

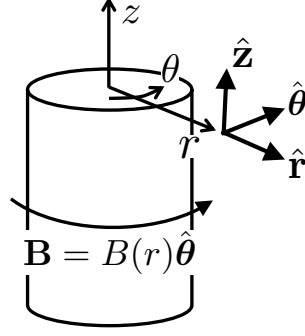


Figure 2: z -pinch and cylindrical coordinates.

3. The z -pinch is a magnetic confinement cylindrical configuration in which the magnetic field closes in azimuthal loops (see Figure 2). The magnitude of the magnetic field depends only on radius, that is, $\mathbf{B} = B(r)\hat{\theta}$. Here we use the usual cylindrical coordinates $\{r, \theta, z\}$ and their associated unit vectors $\{\hat{r}, \hat{\theta}, \hat{z}\}$, shown in figure 2.

The plasma contained in the z -pinch is composed of electrons with charge $-e$ and mass m_e , and one ion species with charge Ze and mass m_i . The distribution functions for both species ($s = i, e$) are bi-Maxwellians that only depend on the radial position,

$$f_{Bs}(r, v_{\parallel}, \mu) = n_s(r) \sqrt{\frac{m_s}{2\pi T_{s\parallel}(r)}} \frac{m_s}{2\pi T_{s\perp}(r)} \exp\left(-\frac{m_s v_{\parallel}^2}{2T_{s\parallel}(r)} - \frac{m_s \mu B(r)}{T_{s\perp}(r)}\right), \quad (8)$$

where $n_s(r)$, $T_{s\parallel}(r)$ and $T_{s\perp}(r)$ are the density, parallel temperature and perpendicular temperature of species s . The equilibrium electric field is zero, $\mathbf{E} = 0$, and the densities of electrons and ions satisfy quasineutrality, $Zn_i(r) = n_e(r)$. Assume that the ion perpendicular temperature is much smaller than the ion parallel temperature, and that the ion parallel temperature is comparable to the electron parallel and perpendicular temperatures,

$$T_{i\perp} \ll T_{i\parallel} \sim T_{e\parallel} \sim T_{e\perp}. \quad (9)$$

For stability reasons, z -pinches are run at very low β , where β is the plasma energy divided by the magnetic field energy. We proceed to study the stability of a low- β z -pinch to electric field perturbations of the form $\delta\mathbf{E} = -\nabla\delta\phi$, with

$$\delta\phi(r, \theta, z) = \tilde{\phi}(r) \exp(iM\theta + ik_z z - i\omega t). \quad (10)$$

We focus on perturbations that satisfy

$$\frac{M}{r} \sqrt{\frac{T_{i\parallel}}{m_i}} \ll \omega \sim \frac{k_z T_{e\parallel}}{eB} \left| \frac{d}{dr} \ln n_e \right| \sim \frac{k_z T_{e\parallel}}{eBr} \ll \frac{M}{r} \sqrt{\frac{T_{e\parallel}}{m_e}}. \quad (11)$$

- (a) [3 marks] Before considering the perturbations, show that, for low β , the equilibrium magnetic field satisfies

$$\frac{d}{dr} \ln B \simeq -\frac{1}{r}. \quad (12)$$

- (b) [5 marks] Show that the perturbed electron density is given by

$$\tilde{n}_e = \frac{e\tilde{\phi}}{T_{e\parallel}} n_e. \quad (13)$$

(c) [12 marks] Show that the perturbed ion density is given by

$$\tilde{n}_i = \frac{Ze\tilde{\phi}}{T_{i\parallel}} n_i \left\{ \frac{r}{2L_{T_{i\parallel}}} - 1 + \frac{1}{2\zeta} \left[\frac{r}{2L_n} + \left(\zeta^2 - \frac{1}{2} \right) \frac{r}{2L_{T_{i\parallel}}} - \zeta^2 - \frac{1}{2} \right] \right. \\ \left. \times [\mathcal{Z}(\zeta) - \mathcal{Z}(-\zeta) + 2i\sqrt{\pi} \exp(-\zeta^2)] \right\}, \quad (14)$$

where $\zeta = \sqrt{\omega/\omega_{di}}$, $\omega_{di} = 2k_z T_{i\parallel}/eBr$ is the frequency associated to the ∇B and curvature drifts, $L_n = (-d \ln n_i/dr)^{-1}$ and $L_{T_{i\parallel}} = (-d \ln T_{i\parallel}/dr)^{-1}$ are the density and perpendicular temperature characteristic lengths, and $\mathcal{Z}(\zeta)$ is the plasma dispersion function.

[Hint: to obtain this result, decompose $(u^2 - \zeta^2)^{-1}$ into simpler fractions, and be very careful with the difference between the Landau contour of the integral over the resonant denominator $(u + \zeta)^{-1}$ and the Landau contour used in the definition of $\mathcal{Z}(\zeta)$.]

(d) [10 marks] For $1/L_{T_{i\parallel}}$ sufficiently large, the plasma becomes unstable. To calculate the stability boundary, solve the dispersion relation for a purely real ω . Argue that the mode cannot become unstable when $\omega/\omega_{di} < 0$, and hence that ω/ω_{di} must be positive at the stability boundary. In addition to finding the critical value for $r/L_{T_{i\parallel}}$, show that

$$\frac{r}{L_n} \leq 2 + \frac{T_{i\parallel}}{ZT_{e\parallel}} \quad (15)$$

for the plasma to become unstable.
